**SUBJECT:** A RESOLUTION (1) APPROVING ALL AMERICAN ASPHALT TO PROCEED WITH CITYWIDE PAINTING OF CURB HOUSE NUMBERINGS FOR ALL RESIDENTIAL STREETS IN THE AMOUNT OF \$25,700 (2) AUTHORIZE FINANCE TO USE \$25,700 FROM THE CONSTRUCTION CONTINGENCY AMOUNT APPROVED AS PART OF THE FY 2015-2016 ANNUAL PAVEMENT REHABILITATION PROGRAM (PW PROJECT NO. 2015-15) CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT ON JUNE 7, 2016.

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Per request from Councilwoman Lilia Leon, it is requested that the City Council approve the following:

1. Authorize All American Asphalt to proceed with citywide painting of curb house numberings for all residential streets pursuant to the previously approved FY 2015-2016 Annual Pavement Rehabilitation Program (PW Project No. 2015-15) Construction Contract on June 7, 2016, in the amount of \$25,700; and,
2. Authorizes finance to use \$25,700 from the previously approved contingency amount of \$322,200 pursuant to the previously approved FY 2015-2016 Annual Pavement Rehabilitation Program (PW Project No. 2015-15) Construction Contract on June 7, 2016.

### **BACKGROUND:**

As part of the FY 2015-2016 Annual Pavement Rehabilitation Program (PW Project No. 2015-15), the City painted 1100 curb house numberings as part of the scope of work within the project limits.

The scope did not include City-wide number painting. Per request from Councilwoman Leon it is proposed that curbside house numbering be expanded Citywide. Staff has negotiated for the remaining 2000 locations at the price of \$12.85, totaling \$25,700 for

the remaining 2000 curbside house numbering. This amount is within the approved budget and paid from the City Council approved contingency amount of \$322,200.

**ANALYSIS:**

Painting house numbers on street curbs provides a clear and visible means of identifying property addresses. This in turn can improve safety by providing faster emergency response times, as well as facilitate the delivery of goods and services.

**ALTERNATIVES:**

1. Approve staff recommendation
2. Disapprove staff recommendation
3. Provide further direction to staff

**FISCAL IMPACT:**

There is no additional fiscal impact.

The \$25,700 cost to complete the citywide residential streets will come from the previously approved construction contingency in the amount of \$322,200.

**RELATIONSHIP TO STRATEGIC GOALS:**

This item is related to a specific 2016 Strategic Goal to “develop and implement a sustainable CIP Program to ensure the quality of existing infrastructure and support future plans for the City and develop and invest in infrastructure and beautification projects that support economic growth.”
