Mayor Soria called regular City Council meeting to order at 6:16 p.m. in the Council Chambers.

Councilmember Argumedo offered the invocation.

APPEARANCES AND PRESENTATIONS

1. <u>Proclamation Declaring October 23-31, 2019 as "Red Ribbon Week" in the City of Commerce</u>

Mayor and Councilmembers proclaimed October 23, 2019 through October 31, 2019 as "Red Ribbon Week."

PUBLIC COMMENT

Gloria Nezahualcoya asked who is paying for food for Senior Center events organized by Mayor and ruffle prizes. Ms. Nezahualcoya requested that the City Council allows residents to vote on the cannabis issue.

Dave Rodriguez spoke about cannabis and hiring consultants for processing cannabis applications, which cost the City over \$400,000.

Ann Arnow spoke in opposition to City Manager's agreement extension. Ms. Arnow alluded that most of the employees and consultants hire made recently are related to Huntington Park and City Manager Cisneros.

Camila Mirada spoke about human rights and also in opposition to cannabis

ordinances and asked for the right to vote.

James Herrmann spoke in opposition to cannabis.

Alma Sores spoke in opposition to cannabis and asked to keep Commerce clean and safe.

Sharon Basic reported non-operational light and asked why staff did not follow up on her previous complaint.

Richard Hernandez complained about cannabis operation on Washington and Eastern.

14. <u>Update on Consolidated Fire Protection District of Los Angeles Proposed</u>
<u>Tax Measure</u>

Chief Osby, Fire Chief of Los Angeles County, provided an overview of the proposed tax measure. According to Chief Osby, the main goal of this measure is to establish a robust fiscal strategy. The calls for service are gradually increasing, and there are necessary upgrades for infrastructure and communication systems

that are needed. Chief Osby stated that if the City chooses to opt-in, the District will conduct outreach before the election. Mr. Osby also noted that the tax amount collected in the jurisdiction would be only spent in that same jurisdiction. The proposed tax rate of six cents per square foot is for residential and commercial businesses. The District also would bear the cost of the ballot measure preparation and placing it on the ballot.

Discussion took place about the cost for the taxpayers, and whether all tax money collected would stay in the City of Commerce. According to Chief Osby, with the proposed tax rate, the District would receive 2.4 million that will be only spent within Commerce. The majority of funds would be spent on overhead, infrastructure and staffing, and replacement of equipment and upgrades to existing infrastructure. Further discussion took place whether there is a sunset clause in this tax measure and whether six cents proposed tax is the hard number. Chief Osby stated that six cents is not a hard number and could go up or down, and there is no sunset clause.

City Manager Cisneros provided an overview of the staff report. Discussion took place.

Councilmember Rebollo moved, seconded Councilmember by Argumedo, to adopt Resolution approving the Agreement to Purchase and Sale Instructions between Commerce Refuse Escrow the to Energy Authority (CREA), and the City of Commerce, for property located at 5926 South Sheila Street, in the City of Commerce, California. The motion carried by the following vote:
